

#### Our annual Fall Color Tour will take place on Saturday, October 10.

After driving 7 hours and 300 miles today (Sept 29) to check out locations and routes for the Fall Color Tour, Jill and I have determined that the best location for the tour is, in fact, **Wolf Creek Pass**.

The announcement is in the October BMCU Newsletter and I will have an even more copious number of announcement emails flooding the bulletin board, letting people know of the change.

It was a tough decision to make and made with great thought and consideration. The bottom line is this: the fall colors in Northern Utah just are not nearly what they have been in the past. The Monte Cristo location was nearly barren of any Quaky leaves. The other leaves were muted colors. There just were not many trees with color.

The Wolf Creek Pass has many more trees and trees shorter route, time wise. with leaves having color. Of course, there are several days until the Tour, so all of that can/may/ will change. At this time, however, the Wolf Creek location is much more scenic.

FYI, we will now meet at our usual place at the Hogle Zoo at 9am for a 9:30am departure, up Emigration Canyon. The route will take us on a short stretch of I-80 to Exit 146 and the Sinclair station at Silver Creek Jct., to meet up with others and a Drain & Gain. The route will take US-40 to Exit 4, U-248, through scenic, Brown's Canyon. At the "T" intersection with U-32, we will turn Right and travel through Peoa, Oakley, Kamas, and to Francis. At the stop sign in Francis, turn left (East) and continue on U-35 up to the Wolf Creek Summit (9480') where parking will be off the road in a small area, with overflow on the shoulder of the road as we've done in the past.

Unfortunately, the gate to the larger parking area is already padlocked and not accessible to vehicles. As you'll recall, it is just a short walk to the tables in this area.

After eating, members can continue east to Hanna and Tabiona, where they may turn around, retracing the route or turn right on U-208 and hook up with US-40 and back to Heber. Of course, retracing the route from the summit lunch area will make for a shorter route, time wise.

In no time, we were in Springville and heading towards our lunch spot. And this is where it went wrong for several








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### Up Hobble Creek Canyon

Considering what British Leyland did to Little British Cars (LBCs) there may never be another.



## BRITISH COMMERCIAL VEHICLE MUSEUM

"The Popemobile was custom **built by Lancashire Manufacturer British Leyland.** Our museum vehicle ensured the safe transportation of Pope John Paul II, when he visited the UK in 1982, for his 5 day pas-

toral trip. It was designed to allow the Pope to be visible to very large crowds (up to one million plus). **It weighs 24 tons,** has bullet-proof glass, under-floor armour and the body design incorporates low ballistic material, which will repel small firearms. The Leyland Constructor Chassis was chosen for it's renowned "off-road" capability and acceleration if an emergency arose. (Popemobile or Papamobile in Italian, is an



informal name given to the specially designed motor vehicles used by the Catholic Pope during outdoor public appearances)."



The Leyland vehicle also saw service in Africa.

The woman put the boys in her car, and took the mischievous duo to the police.

It turned out that the boys had been plotting their daring escape for days, digging a hole under the fence using their sandbox spades.

The kindergarten only noticed the boys were absent after they'd been gone for 30 minutes.

Local authorities fired the supervisor responsible for looking after the kids, also giving a warning to the kindergarten's director.
